Meeting

Emphasis of meeting:

Fossil mollusks.

Dr. Walter H. Wheeler of the Geology and Geography Department, University of North Carolina will speak to the group on fossil shells.

Location of meeting:

One and one-half (1 1/2) miles south of Lumberton, N. C. on U. S. Highway 74 just past the power plant turn off on a small dirt road. This road will take you to a fossil shell deposit where the meeting will be held. Signs will be posted on the road so that those attending will recognize the site. The Highway Patrol may possibly be there to assist the parking since parking facilities at the sight are rather limited.

Facilities:

Those attending are asked to bring a picnic lunch and cold drinks or water since no eating facilities or motels exist near by. If you have them, folding chairs or camp stools would be comfortable

If intending to collect, you are advised to wear clothing suited for rough use. Spades, seives, boots, and other equipment may be useful for getting some of the shells. Arrangements are being made for a boat so that members can examine the cliff from the river.

All persons who have any interest in shells are invited to attend this meeting. This will be a splendid opportunity for many of our members and non-members to find out that worthwhile shell collecting is not always done on the sea-coast. It is certainly hoped that the weather man will give the meeting more of a break than he did for the winter meeting in Morehead City.
