### THOUGHTS ON MY YELLOW PAD from President Dottie Weber

"Getting To Know You" is the theme I have chosen for the North Carolina Shell Club for 1992.

On the plus side, we have something in common and that's SHELLS. Some members thrive on the challenge of collecting SHELLS and researching and learning the scientific names. Others delve even deeper into SHELLS to discover how they live, eat grow and reproduce. Most members either collect, buy or trade SHELLS. Lots of folks just enjoy the beauty of SHELLS and many of this group go on to create exquisite arts and crafts such as pictures, decorations and jewelry.

So, with this in common it makes good sense for us to get to know more about the person sitting next to us or in front of us or who comes in the door as we do.

I have set a goal for myself this year .... to get to know more about the individual members of our Club and to try to make people feel welcome at a North Carolina Shell Club meeting, whether they are brand new members or visitors or those who have been here long before I arrived. #### PROGRAM NOTES

On <u>Friday evening</u>, we visit the newly-opened <u>Museum of Coastal Carolina</u> at Ocean Isle for the first time and the program will be a tour of that Museum. The most impressive exhibit is one which puts you in the middle of a simulated, but very realistic, underwater setting with a multitude of life-size sea creatures to observe. Another feature is a collection of North Carolina seashells, to which some of our members have contributed. There is a gift shop and there are other exhibits including civil war artifacts, natural history dioramas, and displays of animals and bird life. Refreshments will be provided by the local shell club, The Beachcombers.

On <u>Saturday during the day</u>, there is the opportunity for shelling, which is pretty good at Ocean Isle and Holden Beach. The Beachcombers Shell Club will give us a map showing the best collecting areas. The tides are not always favorable (to say the least), but this time it will be low at 9:28am. At 1:00pm, we have an extraordinary opportunity to see the fabulous shell collection of members Zida and William Kibler in their huge and unique mansion named Paradise; there are many more shells than the mind can absorb.

The house itself is a jumble of components gleaned from just about everywhere. There are 147 beams from a mattress factory, slate shingles from a railroad depot, stained glass windows and marble steps from a church, an old iron fence from a graveyard, street cobblestones, and parts of 2 warehouses, a schoolhouse and 57 other houses. This "junk" has been assembled into a spellbinding house with 18 rooms, each with a different theme .... so magnificent that it is now appraised, along with the ten acres on which it sits, at over \$375,000.

This value has made it very difficult to pay the taxes and has created "Trouble In Paradise", as the Raleigh News and Observer puts it in a recent page-and-a-half article. So, Zida has opened a shop to sell parts of her collections and plans soon to begin paid tours of the hose a few days a week. The admision price of \$6 per person helps to keep the house going and to pay for insurance necessary to cover visitors. Come join us!

On <u>Saturday evening</u>, in an uncharacteristic display of fancy footwork, we appear at a different meeting place. Our speaker is longtime member Ruth Dixon, who has collected thruout a 30-year period in North and South Carolina, Florida, Nassau, Eleuthera, Grand Cayman, Cayman Brac, Mexico, Canada, Costa Rica, Guam, Hawaii, the Philippines, Palau, Eqypt and Italy. Whew! She will give a summary of her career to this point by showing us those shells that she considers to be her best and by including slides of several of the exotic collecting locales. Don't miss it!



#### THE 1991 SHELL SHOW

Thanks go to scientific judges Kevan Sunderland and Bill Mansfield and to art and craft judges Linda Sunderland and Janet Truckner. Alta Van Landingham initially arranged for the dealers and Karlynn Morgan took over. Neal Schey provided our sign. Carl Truckner, Janet Truckner, and Dorothy Weber laid out the exhibit space. Carl accompanied and assisted the scientific judges.

Several people helped to look after the club table, answering questions from the public and signing up new members. This was done on an informal basis, rather than through scheduling, and seemed to work quite well. Thanks to all who helped in any capacity to make the show a success.

New exhibitors included Nancy and John Timmerman -- each with a novice collection -- and Becky, Julie, Sherri, and Benjamin Piech, who collaborated on a junior collection, the first in many years.

We had only nine exhibitors in total, undoubtedly the smallest number we have ever had. However, there were 21 displays and most of them were quite large. Cur greatest loss was in art and craft exhibits. We had only two small ones after last year's biggest and best effort ever.

Herman Lindsey brought six displays and accounted for 41% of the space. While this made him the hero of the show, it also illustrates what a precarious position we were in. If that one person had been away traveling this year, we would have had to scramble at the last hour to force extra exhibits and might even have had to cancel the show.

Further illustrating the problem is that Bill and Bunny Fulton's three exhibits took up 19% of the space. Vicky Wall brought five exhibits and filled 10% of the space.

The show cost the club nothing this year, except for the mailing which announced it. The Mall had to spend only \$876 of the \$1500 maximum that it had agreed to. Actual expenses were \$800 more than that but were offset by gross revenue from shell dealers.

Art & Craft Without Actual Shells

1st: Bunny Fulton 1st: Vicky Wall Scott and Nell have just finished two years of service to the club in providing liquid refreshments at the meetings. During the same period Nell was on the Executive Committee as a Member-at-Large. They have generously provided many door prizes and auction items over the years, including Nell's very popular shell-decorated shirts.

Both have been life-long residents of North Carolina, except during Scott's four years in the navy in Florida and New Jersey. They have been in the North Carolina Shell Club for about seven years. They were married in 1978 after both lost their spouses earlier in the 70's. Scott has two children. Nell says that their once-a-month lunches became something else after she decided that Scott had been single long enough.

Nell's family farmed cotton and picked its own. She was first married at 14 and didn't finish high school, completing only the ninth grade. Later, she attended Gardner Webb College, Lenoir-Rhyne College, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, receiving an AB in Public School Music and a master's degree in social work. She is currently the Income Maintenance Program Administrator in Cabarrus County. She reports that she is a full-time North Carolina resident who somehow managed to see the Pacific Ocean before she saw the Atlantic.

Scott's parents owned the Black Mountain Drug Store and Soda Shop. He has owned and operated an oil company and a furniture store. He worked for twenty years for the North Carolina Department of Social Services, retiring about 18 months ago. His interests and skills include carpentry, handyman activities, boating, fishing, reading, and — according to Nell — making people happy. His brother Steve is also a member of the shell club.

Nell says that some of her shirts are appliqued and some are painted, but that most are a combination of the two. It takes her about 45-60 minutes to make one and she completes about two hundred in a year. She also enjoys other crafts, cooking, music, and reading. Both of them collect Tom Clark gnomes, enjoy the grandchildren, and like walking on the beach, especially at their Ocean Isle house.

Their shell collecting began about 1982 and has been done mostly in North Carolina, South Carolina, and Sanibel in Florida. Nevertheless, they have "boxes of shells, cases of shells, and shells everywhere". Nearly all are self-collected, but there are some gifts as well, including a catalogued fossil collection. Their best collecting day was at Shackleford Banks in 1985 when they found a wide variety of shells. Scott's favorite shell is the Scotch bonnet, while Nell leans toward the wentletraps.

Nell is fascinated with teeny-teeny shells. She remembers an occasion when her brother and his wife brought back some uncleaned shells and sea urchins from a beach in Australia. Sand that fell out of one of the urchins provided some excitement when it proved to contain three cadulus not more than 1/4 inch long and several other almost invisible gastropods.
