Welcome to a topsy-turvy weekend! The principal field trip on Friday (WHA-A-A-A-T?) is perhaps a first. We're having two main speakers on one night and none on the other (YA GOTTA BE KIDDING!), and there will be two "Mostly for Beginners" talks the other night (YOU LOST YOUR MARBLES, WALDO?). Well, we don't want anybody to get complacent.

FRIDAY, such as it is

THE FOSSIL TRIP

It was our earnest wish to hold our Castle Hayne fossil trip on Saturday, but it did not work. When we could not pull it off, we took the unusual step of having it on Friday. We hope that workers who are specially interested will be able to take the day off. Our leader is John Timmerman of Wilmington, who is a regular visitor here.

The quarry offers casts of slit shells and other mollusks. That is, the shells are missing but the volume inside the shell has become a fossilized mass in the exact shape of the shell. There are also sea urchins, sea biscuits and sharks' teeth.

We are waiting until 10:30am to begin the trip so that you will have a chance to drive there from home Friday morning. It would be well to come a little early so that you have time to find your way and to be present when we all get together. The pit closes at 5:00pm. There are no facilities, so bring lunch, water and all other supplies you will want. Plan to sign a paper releasing the owners from any responsibility for your injury or death.

We will be guests at the quarry and very privileged to be there. We should give the right of way to all trucks and other company vehicles, park in the designated parking area at the entrance, keep out of the way of industrial operations at all times and follow whatever instructions are given to us.

THE FRIDAY EVENING PROGRAM Our first speaker is

Dr Anne B McCrary, who recently retired as a Professor of Biology at the University of North Carolina at Wilmington. Her specialty has been zooplanktonology, the study of the ocean's tiny animals without backbones. She will show us how some of our shells and other creatures start out in life and their early stage development.

Our second speaker is member Carl Truckner. He will not only have slides of our most recent Wilmington Shell Show in 1992, but will go back many years to a few slides of earlier shows held at other locations in the state.

SATURDAY, different but fun

THE SHELL TRIP We picked this weekend for its favorable tide, low about 11:30am, and we want to take advantage of it, even though we don't expect sensational results.

Our field trip is as improbable as the rest of the weekend. It goes like this: Meet at 10:00am at the first parking lot (to the left) on the entrance road to the Fort Fisher Aquarium. Dean Weber's gray truck with a white top will take people down the four-wheel-drive road toward the mouth of the Cape Fear River.

What makes the plan bizarre is that it will be a slow spine-jarring trip sitting on the truck bed and only about 5 people will fit. This will mean quite a transportation delay if we have a lot more than 5 people. We may have a drawing to see who goes on the first trip, the second, and so on. If you have a four-wheel-drive vehicle to offer, it would be a big help.

For those who don't get to go, there is a beach at the parking lot and an opportunity to walk toward the isolated river mouth. And, there are beaches all along the towns of Kure Beach and Carolina Beach.


THE SATURDAY EVENING PROGRAM The intent is to have a


From Morehead City:

South on US 17; at Hamp stead turn right on Rt 210 (Rocky Point) and stay to left onto Co Rc 1002; go approx 3 miles from Hampstead; turn right onto access road, described in "From Raleigh area" directions; you will pass Ideal Cement plant on right just before the turn.

From Shallotte area:

North on US 17; take exit onto Rt421/133 before Cape Fear River Bridge; take exit onto Rt133/117 (crosses river here); once past river turn left (stay on) Rt133/117; in Castle Hayne turn right onto Maple St, which becomes Holly Shelter Rd at I-40.

THE 1992 SHELL SHOW

Several aspects of the show were notable. The 63 exhibits were more than we have had in a long, long time, possibly the most ever. We tripled last year's number of exhibitors with 28 and nearly doubled the scientific exhibitors with 16.

Help was received from a number of sources. The Beachcombers in the Holden Beach area contributed a multitude of high-quality art and craft exhibits and set up a Christmas tree with shell ornaments. The Shell Belles of the Morehead City area did much the same. Evelyn Kavanaugh from Georgia returned with some prize-winning art and craft entries.

Two other families from Georgia aided the scientific portion of the show, as did one man from South Carolina. Karlynn Morgan produced an exhibit from Florida.

We unexpectedly spent all of the \$1500 allotted by the Mall, principally because of an unprecedented lack of shell dealers. A show twenty percent larger than last year also played a part in the higher expenses.

MEMBER PROFILE: ELSA WENZEL

This profile is of our newest Member-At-Large; we expect to have one of her husband Walt in the next newsletter.

Elsa's first North Carolina Shell Club meeting was at Atlantic Beach in September, 1985, two months after retirement. After a casual interest in shells for about 40 years, she and Walt really got the "shell bug" and geared most trips and endeavors around shells and shell collecting.

They have collected from New England to Texas, including both coasts of Florida; the west coast of mainland Mexico at the Sea of Cortez; the west coast of the Baja Peninsula in Mexico; and from southern California to northern Oregon. Four Hawaiian Islands and Bermuda have also been visited and duly shelled.

They have had so many good and great days of collecting that none stands out in their memory as the best. But they do remember a location on Maui where they were told "There won't be many shells there" but found a good number of different cowries, cones, and other goodies.

Elsa's favorite shell families include the cowries, pectens, miters, and volutes, but her number one favorite is an 11-year-old black and white Party Cocker Spaniel called Marble after Conus marmoreus, the marble cone.

Born on a farm in New York State, Elsa first met Walt when she was 15. She attended Wheelock College in Boston. In the early married years and then later when the children started college, she supplemented the family income by working at the newspaper office in Laramie, Wyoming; by teaching and substituting; and by serving as an optician in an eye doctor's office for 15 years.

She also tied fishing flies professionally for many years, having such customers as Abercrombie and Fitch. You can still buy "El's Caterpillar", the "Wenzel Darter" or "Jay's Wooley Worm". Jay is the son born in Ozark, Alabama.

There are about 2800 species in the Wenzel collection totaling over 20,000 shells. They're a mixture of self-collected, traded, gifts, and purchases. The prettiest are kept in a "shell gallery" of glass shelves and sliding doors off from the living room, and several are used as decorations in every room in the house. The balance are in four cabinets and many boxes in the garage.

Elsa took up golf last May and is addicted. She plays tennis mixed doubles once a week with Walt. Last year she took quilting lessons and started six quilts for grandchildren. She plays bridge with the "girls" twice a month and with Walt and others three times a month.

She has been in "every office you could hold" in the Pine Knoll Shores Garden Club and Pine Knoll Shores Women's Club. She is active in the Ladies Golf Association and is currently secretary to the Pine Knoll Shores Fire Auxiliary.

For five to six weeks in late summer Elsa and Walt take full advantage of the coast, running their 14-foot McKee craft in Bogue Sound, trapping crabs, raking clams, and fishing for pompano, flounder, drum, and sea trout.
