

I heard the trip to Cape Lookout Coast Guard Station yielded the best shelling of all. Maybe next newsletter we will have a report for you.


From Betty Muirhead.....


Native shell collector shares collection with local museum.

Collecting seashells has been an avid hobby of Rutherfordton native Ruth Hood. She's a retired nurse who loves nothing better than grabbing a tin bucket and heading to the nearest beach.

Ruth and husband Bill have lived many places, including the Marshall Islands where Bill worked at a missile site, giving her the opportunity to collect shells from many tropical shores. They recently returned to Rutherfordton, purchasing a home just three blocks from the hospital where she trained as a nurse and graduated in 1948.

Ruxh Hood (right) has given hundreds of her 20-year shell collection to the Rutherford County Museum. Hood shows a channelled whelk shell (below), native to the East Coast, and a whelk egg case, where mollusk shells lay eggs and swim out into the ocean.





Recently, Ruth gave her collection of priceless seashells to the Rutherford County Museum, located at 2 Main Street in Forest City. The exhibit includes hundreds of species from beaches in North Carolina, Georgia, Florida and South Carolina as well as some from the Marshall Islands. "I really am glad I could give something back to the Place where I grew up" Ruth told the reporter while working on the exhibit.


"This is truly a nice and educational addition to the museum that will indeed benefit all museum goers in the area," said Matthew McEnnenery, museum director. "We are lucky to get this collection."

Ruth continues to collect shells at her home in Sunset Beach and has also donated shells to the Ocean Isle Museum at the coast. She is a member of the South Brunswick Island Shell Club and a member of the North Carolina Shell Club, a group that numbers near 300 members from across the state. She has shown her collection in Florida at the Sanibel Island Shell Fair near Fort Myers.

"We shell lovers enjoy our hobby and collecting so much because it is a way of getting close to the natural beauty of the earth." Ruth Hood said.


