





Some of us took way too many clothes and in some rooms getting to sleep was an adventure with all the snoring. We also found out that some of us talk in our sleep. But it gave us something to joke about during our beach combing. Going to the bathroom at night was also quite tricky. We had to go down steep narrow stairs by flashlight since the generated and solar power was off between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.

MUSEUM SNARES SHARK TEETH

Raleigh, NC....The State Museum of Natural Sciences has acquired 25 beautifully preserved teeth from a 4million-year-old precursor of the great white shark.

The teeth belonged to a Charcharodon megalodon, or "megatooth shark" the largest marine predator known in the fossil record. The prehistoric shark was 42 feet long, weighed several tons and had jaws that stretched 6 feet wide and 7 feet high.

The museum purchased the teeth for \$25,000 from Rebecca Hyne of Greenville, NC, an amateur fossil hunter. She had received higher offers from private collectors.

Hyne found the teeth at Aurora phosphate mine where the rich collection of marine fossils dates back 15 million years. Hyne was leading a group of fossil-seekers when she spied something brown and sharp poking out of a pile of rock and clay. The edge was so sharp she cut herself when she touched it.


The set of teeth will provide researchers with a valuable tool for studying sharks.

"These are the best set of over-5-inch teeth that have ever been found," said Vince Schneider, curator of paleontology at the museum.

The teeth will go on display in the museum's new building due to open in 1999. The teeth will be reconstructed to form a jaw, and visitors will be able to punch a button and project the whole shark bearing down on them.

Finding such a set is rare and means the shark died, and was buried on the ocean floor instead of being scavenged. Sharks lose teeth continuously and so single teeth finds are much more common.

The Charcharodon megalodon hunted in the deep waters over Auroro, back when it was covered by the Atlantic Ocean. Its earliest ancestors swam in the primitive oceans 100 million years before the dinosaurs even appeared, and its descendants have persisted long after the great land reptiles vanished.

Mark as well as Ann Buddenhaggen have been hard at work developing the new trophy the "Hugh Porter Award". This will be given to an exhibit that merits high recognition in exhibitry of shells from Western Atlantic provinces including the Boreal, Virginian, Carolinian and Caribbean. It will be an annual award on par with the COA or DuPont awards.

The Friday evening meeting of the shell club will take place at Cape Fear Museum. I have reserved the learning center/class room on the first floor of the museum for the program.

Mary Ann Adkins has arranged for the clubs annual banquet at Shell Island Resort/Hotel, the north end of Shell Island (Wrightsville Beach). It will be Saturday evening. (see enclosed information about that event).



1996 NORTH CAROLINA SHELL SHOW CATEGORIES

- 1. North Carolina Collection; All specimens must be self collected. Includes: Salt and Fresh water, Land, and Fossil Mollusks.
- 2. Regional Self Collected. 100% self collected
- 3. Regional Collection. Any Source.
- 4. Worldwide Self Collected. 100% self collected.
- 5. World Wide Any Source.
- 6. Freshwater Collection. Any Source.
- 7. Land Snails. Any source.
- 8. Fossil Mollusks. Any source.
- 9. Specialized Collection. Freaks, Albinos, Growth Series, Variations, Color forms, etc.
- 10. A Single Shell. If self collected, note on label.
- 11. Family or Genus Collection. Super Family, Family or Genus.
- 12. Miniature Collection. Shells 20 millimeters length or less.
- 13. Educational Collection. Prime object is to teach.
- 14. Junior Collection. Entrants ages 15 years and below.
- 15. Novice Collection. Entrants who have never exhibited in a shell show.
- 16. Scallop Dump Shells. Scallop dump shells may only be entered in this category
- 17. Marine life exhibits. Specimens related to the sea such as coral, and crabs. Also includes non molluskan fossils.
- 18. Shell Photography. Photographs, slides, etc. Made only by the exhibitor.
- 19. Art and Craft using Actual Shells. Floral arrangements, mirrors, lamps, jewelry, pictures, Sailor's valentines, etc.
- 20. Art and Craft Depicting but not using Shells. Paintings, sculpture, fabric art, etc.
- 21. Other. If it does not fit any of the above categories.



1996 NORTH CAROLINA SHELL SHOW

Rules and Regulations

- 1. A complete, signed application must be submitted for each entry.
- 2. Entries can be made in as many categories as desired. Content of each exhibit must be for that one entry only. For example: Category # 9. Specialized Collection, could not be considered as part of a Category 5. entry.
- 3. Contents of the exhibit must be property of the exhibitor and may not be for sale during the show.
- 4. Any exhibit which has won first place in another North Carolina Shell show must be reworked at least 50%, ie. new/or additional labeling and specimens.
- 5. The name of the exhibitor must not show on any part of the he exhibit until after judging is complete. The club will supply name cards for each exhibit after judging.
- 6. Awards and trophies will be given only if Judges deem exhibits worthy of receiving them. Judges decisions are final.
- 7. Exhibits may be as large as the entrant wants. Width is limited to 30 inches. Electricity is available. Backs of posters, maps, easels, etc should be well finished so as not to be unsightly to exhibits on other side of the isle. All such apparatus must be free standing.
- 8. Exhibits must be contained in some sort of covered box or case. This is for the safety of the collections. Very large shells may be displayed uncovered.
- 9. Exhibits must remain in place for the duration of the show. Early removal may cause loss of eligibility for future shows.
- 10. Failure to bring an entry to the show may result in charge for table space and loss of future eligibility for the show.
- 11. No advertising or selling of merchandise will be allowed in or around the show other than dealers who have filed a complete application.
- 12. Content of the arts and crafts exhibits must be the sole creation of the entrant, excluding support apparatus such as cases, pedestals, frames, easels, etc.
- 13. All judges decisions are final. Exhibitors may discuss their display(s) with the judges after awards are given. They are asked to confine discussion to their own display.
- 14. Suggestions or complaints concerning the show must be directed to the North Carolina Shell Club, Board of Directors. People doing so to any other party risk expulsion from the show.



notes: NORTH CAROLINA SHELL SHOW 1996

The following features of entries will figure strongly to the judges.

- Arrangement, attractiveness and originality
 Accuracy of labeling and scientific facts.
- 3. Quality and choice of Specimens.

The "Best Shell In The Show" and "Best Self-Collected Shell In The Show" awards can be awarded to any shell, in any exhibit category in the show. They are an exception to rule # 2. Winners do not necessarily have to be entered in the single shell category. If the entrant wishes a self collected shell be considered for the latter of the two awards, be sure to make it clear on the label that it is self collected if the category it is entered in is not a "self collected" one.

The "Best Arts and Crafts" Trophy may be awarded to any one entry from categories 18, 19 or 20.

"Scallop Dump Shells" is a category because some truly beautiful shells are found in these sources but locality is sketchy, at best, thus not in keeping with a mission of the show to promote thorough scientific documentation.

Set up will take place during regular Cape Fear Museum hours. The museum has a loading dock, rolling carts and a freight elevator for large loads. A passenger elevator is also available for carrying exhibits to the second floor exhibit area. Though the museum has an admission charge, exhibitors and visitors seeing the show only, will not be charged to enter.







The North Carolina Shell Club is proud to announce the creation of a new award in honor long time member and professional, Hugh Porter. Hugh Porter, a retired faculty member of the University of North Carolina Institute of Marine Sciences has worked for the Universtiy for 41 years. He authored Sea Shells of North Carolina (soon to be released in a new updated and expanded volume).

North Carolina Shell Show categories qualifying for this award include #1, North Carolina Colelction, #2, Regional Self Collected, #3, Regional Any Source Collection, #9, Specialized Colelction, #11, Family or Genus Collection, #12. Miniature Collection, #13, Educational Collection and #21, Other (if none of these describe the entry that is within the definition of the award.

Exhibits must feature marine mollusks from all or sections of the Western Atlantic including the Boreal, Virginian, Carolinian and Carribbean Provinces. All shells included in this category must have come from these provinces. Species that occur in these provinces but were collected in neighboring provinces do not qualify.

The exhibit will be judged for accuracy of scientific labeling and data. The entry may include the entire region or a specific section of it. Completeness of representative fauna is very important including obscure or "unattractive" species. Accurate locality data is a must. Biological observations and natural history are also a definite plus. Though professionalism is encouraged in all entries to the show it will be particularly important for this category. As with the COA and DuPont awards, if no exhibit qualifies, the award
