The speaker at the banquet will be Dr. Harry Lee, our judge from Florida, His topic is "C. S. Rafinesque, odd oracle of the Ohio." This talk will deal with the life and scientific contributions of Constantine Samuel Rafinesque (1783-1840). Rafinesque was an eccentric pioneer naturalist with broad tastes, prodigious knowledge, and a knack for leaping from one project to the next before satisfying his scientific audience. His work with the naiads of the Ohio River and its tributaries was sentinel, and he was decades ahead of his contemporaries in conceptualizing relationships within that group of freshwater clams.

As usual, no special trip is planned for Saturday, so that members and guests may visit the shell show.

York [Discovery Channel]

who rescued it as weighing about August 11, 1999 — An ancient sea turtle, estimated to be 100 years old, was rescued from an area near the Verrazano Narrows in New York Harbor on Tuesday. The huge turtle was described by the Coast Guard officers 600 pounds (270 kg) and being half the size of a steer.

The Atlantic Green turtle, one of the largest sea-going turtles and an endangered species, was discovered during an inspection of a ship moored in the harbor. It had become tangled in a line to a lobster cage and it was weakened from struggling to stay afloat.

The rescuers released the reptile back into the sea rather than taking it to a local aquarium. "This is an unusual case," said Coast Guard officer Don Wagner. "It has been doing well for a hundred years, so it was better to let it go."



The 1999 Conchologist of America Convention by Vicky Wall




many new people and saw many old friends during the week. About 250 people were in attendance during the week, representing 28 shell clubs and several foreign countries. This convention included many slide presentations(daily) covering topics such as Freshwater Mussels, Shelling in Belize, Shelling in the Caribbean, Taxonomy of Mollusks, and information on shell books. During the week, there were seven silent auctions, in which the participants could bid on great shells with pencil and paper. The 66+ lot oral bid auction was one of the highlights of the week. Items up for bid included shell books, common and rare shells, and shell related items. The highest bid was \$1000 for a rare cowry (I'll try to get it's name later). The other highlight of the week was the 30+ dealer bourse. Imagine a huge conference room filled with beautiful shells, jewelry, shell stamps, shell coins, and books, all for sale. Shells ranged in price from \$1.00 all the way up to \$5500.00 (another cowry!!).

Earlier in the week a mini shell show was held, called the COA Shell Derby. Approximately 30 exhibits in 7 categories were on display. Winners in each category were awarded a beautiful ribbon and plaque. Later in the week, several field trips were offered to participants. These included a freshwater collecting trip (which had to be canceled due to high water), a trip to the Falls of the Ohio (a 200 million year old coral reef formation), a trip to Churchill Downs, and a trip to historic Bardstown Kentucky. Informal trips were also offered during the week to those Shellers who were antiquers!

Our hotel, the Galt House, was located right on the Ohio River. From our balcony we could see huge barges going down the river, and docked in front was an old steam paddle boat, complete with a musical calliope. All of the convention events were held in the hotel, which was very relaxing and convenient.

The convention was concluded with a dinner banquet. The main speaker was Dr. Emily Vokes, a well-known authority on mollusks, specializing in Murex. She gave a very interesting talk about archaeology and shells.

This was my third COA convention. Previously I attended conventions in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida and St. louis, Missouri. These conventions are a lot of fun and it's great to meet so many other people interested in shells. Next year's convention will be held June 22-26, 2000 in Houston, Texas. The 2001 convention will be held in Melbourne, Florida. I encourage our shell club members to consider attending a future COA convention and to consider going the COA. The quarterly magazine is very informative and this organization is very devoted to shell collecting interest and conservation.
