Long-Distance malacology.

Doug Wolfe recently had a phone call from son Nick in Portland, Oregon, about some interesting slugs found under a brick next to his garden. The slugs, about 2 inches long, had inconspicuous (about onequarter inch) shells on their rear ends. The little shells were shaped like tiny abalones. A quick check in the library proved these interesting little creatures to be Testacella haliotidea Draparnaud, 1801. In the family Testacellidae, these slugs are of western European origin, having been introduced to North America with nursery plants. They are carnivorous, preying on earthworms with their long, sharp, backward-directed radular teeth. Ordinarily these snails are hard to find, despite their association with man in well-manured gardens and rubbish heaps where earthworms abound. Nick preserved a couple of specimens for Doug and provided a picture for us as well. [attachment picture shows two live specimens in which the tiny shell is visible near the large posterior of the animal]

The North Carolina Aquarium on Roanoke Island

From the internet

Located on 14 acres of property overlooking the Croatan Sound, the North Carolina Aquarium on Roanoke Island features fresh and salt water tanks ranging from 300 to 12,000 gallons. All of the animals housed at the aquarium are native to or seasonal to North Carolina waters.

The Roanoke Island Aquarium, located on Airport Road, three miles north of Manteo, off US 64, is open daily throughout the year. There is a nominal admission charge.

The North Carolina Aquarium on Roanoke Island is one of three state aquariums located along our coast. Visit our other aquariums at Pine Knoll Shores near Morehead City, and at Fort Fisher near Wilmington. Membership in the North Carolina Aquarium Society offers many benefits including free admission year-round to the three aquariums, the North Carolina Zoo, and over 120 other zoos and aquariums around the country.

Exhibits


Exhibits and displays at the North Carolina Aquarium on Roanoke Island focus on the state's diverse aquatic environments.

- The award-winning "Secrets of the Salt Marsh" highlights the salt marshes of the Outer Banks and its inhabitants. The observation tank allows visitors to touch and learn about creatures of the marsh such as crabs, clams, sea stars, and whelks.
- The "Mysteries of the Deep Gallery" includes 14 salt water tanks teeming with marine fishes, invertebrates, and reptiles native to the North Carolina coast.
- The aquarium's newest exhibit, "It's the Big One," highlights sportfishing, the
 activity for which the Outer Banks is world famous.
- Get a bird's eye view of life in an osprey nest at "The Osprey: An Environmental Success Story" exhibit. A video camera located in an active nest on the aquarium grounds gives an up-close look at the American osprey.
- The "Grady-White Shark Gallery" features several species of sharks that are found off the North Carolina coast. Shark jaws and teeth, display panels and graphics, and a continuous-loop videotape tell the story of these creatures of the deep.
- Outside in the aquarium courtyard, the "Coastal Carolina Wetlands" exhibit features alligators, turtles, lizards, snakes, and frogs.
- Other outdoor exhibits include a shoreline boardwalk with observation decks and mounted telescopes overlooking the Croatan Sound, an excavation area white visitors can dig for fossilized shark's teeth, and a nature trail.

England's Queen Elizabeth I issued a charter to Sir Walter Raleigh to establish a colony on Roanoke Island in 1584. An expedition arrived and eventually took two intelligent natives, Manteo and Wanchese, along with promising reports of a new land, back to England. In 1585, another expedition which included artist John White, Thomas Hariot, and others made their way to Roanoke Island. These colonists only lasted through the winter and spring before accepted a ride in June 1586 with Sir Francis Drake who was passing by enroute home from the West Indies.

Sir Richard Grenville arrived on Roanoke Island a few weeks later, only to find it deserted. He left fifteen of his own men to maintain England's claim to the new land. In 1587, John White returned leading another expedition that was bound for the Chesapeake Bay. With the intention of only stopping by to pick up the men left earlier by Grenville, the settlers were put ashore by a captain intent on returning to a privateering expedition. No trace of the 15 men were ever found, and the colonists soon found themselves without supplies. White agreed to return to England. When he was finally able to return in 1590, these colonists had too disappeared, including his granddaughter Virginia Dare. The only clue to their disappearance was the word "Croatoan" carved on a tree.

Various theories have surfaced throughout the years as to what happened to the Lost Colony, and one by one, they seem to have been discounted. The Jamestown (Virginia) settlers appear to have been the only ones to try and make contact with any living lost colonists. Records of the explorations have been documented, and they seem to have come close on several occasions to actually locating the missing colonists. So, today, over 400 years have passed, and no one really knows their fate - and probably no one ever will.



Today, the Manteo / Roanoke Island area is a focal point of the northern Outer Banks. It is the Dare County seat of government, and Roanoke Island is home to several popular attractions, restaurants, and the fishing village of Wanchese. There are numerous place to walk the beaches, from Kitty Hawk to Pamlico sound along the outer banks. Shelling is usually best in spring and late fall. Occasionally you can find a nice tun shell, helmet, or even the scotch bonnet, our state shell.

Paul Green's Lost Colony -- the first outdoor drama in the US-- is located on the island. The majestic Elizabethan Gardens are also here.

Roanoke Island Festival Park:


Admission to Roanoke Island Festival Park includes the Elizabeth II sailing vessel; the film The Legend of Two Path; the 8500 square foot Exhibit Hall which chronicles 400 years of Outer Banks history through interactive exhibits; and The Settlement Site, where visitors are able to interact with Elizabethan soldiers. Also on site is The Pavilion, a large outdoor theater; a Museum Store with abundant treasures; The Gallery, which features monthly changing exhibits; sound side boardwalks which adjoin the Roanoke Island bike path; and more.

History, entertainment, and incredible beauty are all around, so be sure to explore!


