

We remember and will miss, Paul Jennewein, who was a long time member and past President of the North Carolina Shell Club. He was also a reporter and the following article was in the Wilmington Morning Star. / SATURDAY, AUGUST 5, 2000 BY,AGNES BLUM

Former newspaperman Paul Jennewein died Thursday at age 81.-

Mr. Jennewein graduated from Wesleyan, University in Connecticut, but spent the past 50 years in the Wilmington area. His father, Carl Paul Jennewein, was a renowned Sculptor whose work stands, among other places, in Brookgreen Gardens, SC.

Mr. Jennewein got his writing start in the Army Air Corps, predecessor to the Air Force, in 1942 when he enlisted. In the service, he wrote military history.

After marrying Virginia Nesbitt in 1946, the newlyweds moved to Wrightsville Beach and Mr. Jennewein started work at the Wilmington News, the former afternoon newspaper.

In a first-person reminiscence written when he retired in 1984, he told of an unsuccessful bid for a raise that resulted in a promotion to farm editor. At least he got to keep all the produce he wanted, Mr. Jennewein wrote. Mr. Jennewein left the newspaper business briefly for a short career as a newscaster at WECT, Wilmington's first television station. He returned to the *Wilmington News* and soon became the managing editor. He was the last reporter at the paper when it, folded, and he joined the ranks of the *Morning Star*, its sister paper. In addition to covering business and religion, Mr. Jennewein wrote the "Along the Cape Fear" column.

Among his contributions to the *Morning Star* was his tall tale of the Christmas Flounder. The story of so- called Yuletide custom and its origin during the Great Depression, when folks were so poor they presumably couldn't afford a turkey, originated in one of Mr. Jennewein's columns. "He made it up close to 1950," said his wife, Virginia. One "evening around Christmastime, the Jenneweins were near the sound and saw someone floundering. "He said, 'They're getting their Christmas flounder,' " Mrs. Jennewein said.

The rest - including an elaborate description of how folks would stuff the flounder with oysters, collards and other native delicacies was pure fiction.

"He invented it," Mrs. Jennewein said. Nevertheless, each Christmas Eve *the Morning Star* retells on its editorial page a version of the charming but mostly untrue story of the Christmas Flounder. Leslie Gruber, the retired regional editor of the *Morning Star*, remembered Mr. Jennewein as a good writer. "He was a stickler for English", Mr. Gruber said.

Mr. Jennewein retired from, the paper in 1984 but continued his popular boating column until November of 1999. Assistant City Editor Tricia Vance contributed to this report


